

Key physical and human features of Italy

Apennine Mountains	The largest mountain range in Italy that runs almost the entire length of the country. The highest point is Corno Grande (the 'great horn').	
The Po River	The longest river in Italy at just over 405 miles long.	
Mount Vesuvius	An active, composite volcano located on the Gulf of Naples. It was responsible for destroying the city of Pompeii in 79 AD.	
The Colosseum	The largest amphitheatre built by the Romans in 80 AD. It was used for large spectacles such as gladiator fights and exotic animal displays.	
The Vatican City	A city-state surrounded by Rome and home of the Roman Catholic Church. It is home to the Pope, St Peter's Basilica and the Sistine Chapel.	
The Leaning Tower of Pisa	Completed in 1350, this tower is 56 metres tall. It was originally intended to stand straight but as it was being built, the south side began to sink.	
Lake Garda	Located in northern Italy, Lake Garda is Italy's largest lake.	
Palatine Hill	Believed to be the birthplace of Rome and the most ancient part of the city.

Italy is a peninsula (a piece of land almost surrounded by water) and has a Mediterranean climate which means it has hot, dry summers and cool, wet winters.


The economy

Today, Italy's wine counts for almost 20% of the entire world's production. Italy also makes money on luxury goods such as clothing, shoes and cars.
